

We're still in the shadow of the Great Recession


- Several trends are fueling pressure on municipal budgets:
 - Continued high demand for services
 - Continued cuts in state aid to communities
 - Slump in real estate values
- Other long-term factors to consider:
 - Changing state demographics
 - Continued downshifting from state, without changes in policy.




Demand for services

- Growth in demand for social services has slowed since recession, but caseloads have not declined and still remain at historic highs.
 - Food stamp recipients
 - Up 29.4% since 2009
 - Up 100% since June 2007, to ~119,000 people
 - Medicaid caseloads
 - Up 13.2% since 2009
 - Up 27.9% since June 2007, to ~130,000 people
 - Homeless "bed nights"
 - Up 14.5% since 2010








Both home prices & sales have stabilized, though remain flat


NH Single-Family Residential Home Sales and Price (MLS)

Result: Slump in Property Valuations


Total NH Local Property Valuation per Person






State Contribution falls by 4% on per capita basis


Change in Inflation Adjusted Per Capita State Municipal Contribution, 2007 - 2011






Spending growth has slowed, but not everywhere


Annual Change in Total Per Capita Inflation Adjusted Appropriations, 2007 to 2011






Per-person property tax burden continues to grow


Change in Property Tax Receipts Per Person, Infation Adjusted 2007 - 2011


Change in Per Capita, Inflation Adjusted Appropriations 2007 to 2011






Per-pupil spending has slowed, though still rising


Local Education Appropriations per school-aged child (under 19 years old)






Local school spending continues to rise slightly


Change in Per Capita Local School Appropriations, 2007 to 2011





State contribution stays flat (except for most cities)


Annual Percent Change in Per-Capita State Contribution to Schools, 2007 to 2011






NH School Age Population Change by Town, 2000 to 2010











Migration has effectively stalled





 - How might program goals be redefined in light of demographic and other changes?




The state-local relationship



State Aid is Down, While Local Appropriations Up








Increased pressure on Property Tax


Share of Total Local Activities Funded by the Property Tax in New Hampshire, 2001-2011




Changes in NH School Building Aid spending, 2002-2013




Changes in NH Catastrophic Aid payments, 2002-2012






Retirement system

State Retirement Contribution to Municipalities, 2002-2013










Meals & Rooms Distributions to Local Communities, 2002-2013



Meals and Rooms Distribution: Municipal Percentage 2001-2013







State Revenue Sharing, 2002-2012






State water grants


NH Public Water System Grants, 2002-2013

State Aid Grants for Pollution Control, 2002-2013







 - \$21 million




Looking ahead: 2014-15 Budget conversation

- What might this mean for "temporary" suspensions in local aid programs, such as Meals-and-Rooms tax distribution and Revenue Sharing?

Pressure points: Revenues

- Tax changes due to take effect in 2014-2015:
 - Change in Business Enterprise Tax credit
 - ~\$8 million
 - Change in Net Operating Loss Carryover
 - ~\$40 million
 - Change in BET threshold
 - ~\$6 million



Other pressure points

- USNH and Community College budgets
- Hospital payments
- Retirement system
- Expanded gambling?



Federal bailout? Not likely

- Continued uncertainty stemming from the resolution to the "fiscal cliff" could mean a loss of \$32 million in federal aid to NH in FY2013 alone.
- Those decisions must be made by March 1 (maybe.....)
